David Clemons was born in Ypsilanti, Michigan in 1950. Dave found himself to be mechanically inclined around the age of 13, so his dad let him disassemble and tinker with old lawn mower engines to get his feet wet. Dave bought his first bike, a Honda 305 Scrambler, in 1966, while working at Zimmers Service Station. Now this wasn't just a fill 'er up type gas station, it was a full blown repair shop. Dave was

able to learn a trade and earn money at the same time. On the job training at its best. Dave had found his profession.

His childhood buddy, Sid Beavers also bought a bike and the duo was off competing in hare

scrambles and cross country enduros all around Michigan.
After buying his first motorcycle, his mechanical interests
focused more toward bikes and he was always tearing down,
tuning up, or rebuilding bikes of all kinds. In 1971, Dave
got a job at the Ford Motor Company where his dad, Willie
worked. Production line work was not Daves forte and he only
lasted for three months. Dave accepted a job with Jake's
Harley-Davidson in Garden City, Michigan. Jake's was a
major player in the Harley-Davidson market. Willie told Dave

that he shouldnt leave Ford and that hed "never be able to make a living working on motorcycles." Dave started at Jake's at a whopping \$125 per week plus commission (pc) which was decent money at the time. His boss told him that if he worked out that he would be raised to \$150 (pc) in six weeks. He also told him that if he worked real hard, that he could be making \$250 (pc) per week within a year. Those words would come back to haunt him. A year later Dave called his boss and requested the raise to \$250 (pc). His bosss memory wasnt as good as Daves and he balked at the raise request. It took Daves threat to quit to bring him around. Im sure the fact that Dave put in a call to his prior employer on the spot probably helped seal the deal. He got his \$250 (pc) and later topped out at \$350 (pc) before leaving Jake's in 1978.

Dave met his wife Mary on a blind date in March of 1976. Sid's uncle lived in Dayton, Tennessee and he introduced the two when Sid and Dave had stopped through town on their way to Daytona. They were married later that year (shortly after

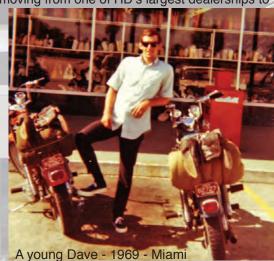


the opening day of deer season.) It's amazing the important things that men can remember, even 41 years later! Mary moved to Michigan and Dave continued working at Jake's until 1978 when they moved to Chattanooga. Before moving Dave had checked out the HD mechanic market in Chattanooga. Pate's Harley-Davidson needed a mechanic but Drue Pate only offered Dave \$150 (pc) per week. Pate's main man was making \$250. Dave asked Drue to set up a "build off" with the other mechanic. They would both take an unassembled engine and build it to completion. If he beat the main man, then Drue would pay him the \$250 (pc). The build off never took place, but Dave got his \$250. The top dog quit when he found out that another mechanic was being hired. Dave was moving from one of HD's largest dealerships to

Pate's, a small mom and pop dealer. To make matters worse, he was taking a big pay cut to do it. He

was apprehensive to say the least, but Mary wanted to move back home and Dave was happy to oblige her. Dave had traveled to the Chattanooga area many times and liked the area and the folks that lived here. Being an avid hunter and fisherman, he fit right into the southern lifestyle. A few years later Dave's buddy Sid Beavers followed him to Chattanooga, soon followed by Sid's brother Charlie (parts manager @ Thunder Creek). From Michiganians to southern good ole boys in the twist of a grip. Dave worked hard at Pate's and developed a large following of loyal friends and customers. These loyal customers would come to be even more important in Dave's future.

In 1981, Dave was present for an historic moment in Harley-Davidson history. He was in Milwaukee attending Harley-Davidson Advanced Training when Willie G. Davidson and a few key executives, all in red wind breakers, halted production at the plant and assembled the workers and students for an important announcement. He then informed everyone that the

Harley-Davidson Motor Company was no longer an AMF company. He announced to the cheering crowd that Harley-Davidson was now an independent company, owned by the people that had invested their lives into the company. They were motorcycle people that believed in Harley-Davldson motorcycles. It was a big gamble, but one that paid off big time. The words on the back of the exec's red wind breakers told the story. They said, "Count On Us". This was Harley-Davidson's new mantra.

The southern living must have suited Dave well because his son, Jason, was born in 1983. Dave's parents moved down in 1985 to complete the family. The Pate's sold the dealership in 1988 to a couple of local businessmen. They operated Pate's until late 1991 until one partner's legal problem caused the franchise to be revoked by the

Harley-Davidson Motor Company. Pate's Harley-Davidson was no more. Dave and the entire staff couldnt believe what they had just heard. There had been a HD dealership in Chattanooga for over 50 years until now. Dave loaded up his tool boxes and headed for the house. Before leaving, Dave asked if he could have the two, eight foot Harley-Davidson signs from the front of the building and they told him yes. Today, one of

those signs hangs in back of Dr .Dave's sales counter. I am

proud to say that the other half hangs on my office wall at Quick Tees. Thanks again Doc, that sign is one of my most prized possessions, not just because of its history, but because of the giver.

By the time the sun had set, Dave was wrenching again. Just because there was no Harley dealer didn't mean that existing Hog owners didn't need service. There were a couple of Harley friendly shops around, but, there was more than

enough work to keep Dave busy. He even exceeded the salary he had been making at Pate's when it closed. His scores of loyal friends and customers followed Dave to the house. And they have followed him there ever since. He operated out of the garage in his home on Jenkins Road for 18 months before he was offered a job at the new Steel Harley Davidson on Chapman Road. In addition, he was to have first refusal to buy the dealership after Steel had operated it for five years. Dave lasted working for Phil Steel exactly one week. That was time enough to make it evident to Dave that he would

never have the support he needed from Steel to run the service department like Dave felt it

should be run.

Well.... back to the house. This would be his second trip to the house in the last year and a half. This time, however, he wasn't nearly as worried as when he had left Pate's. This time he knew that he would be a lone wolf, a solo mechanic, without the headache of employees or the problems associated with them. Things would now be done Dave's way the right way. He built a small building behind his house and he was off and running. What would he call his new business? Dave's lifelong nickname had always been ClemDog, but that all changed when R. J. "BRO" Steen suggested the name Dr. Dave's Service for his new business. ClemDog became Dr. Dave and the DOCTOR WAS IN. In 1993, Dave moved his shop from Jenkins Road to his new home, Clemonspine Farm, on London Lane in Apison,

Tennessee. At Clemonspine, Mary raises miniature horses and Dave "plays motorcycle" as he calls it. His 6,000 square foot building contains his showroom, his shop, and of course his toys. These include his black ElectraGlide, Jason's Sportster, two black Corvettes, bass boat, and Kubota

riding lawn mover. Dave is an avid outdoorsman and he's been known to own a gun or two. Now, I don't know where he keeps his guns, but I'll bet they're nearby. Dave can see his shop from his house and I personally wouldn't care to challenge his marksmanship, especially at only 600 feet. "It's an easy shot" says Dave. Dave's Mom, "Granny" (It's

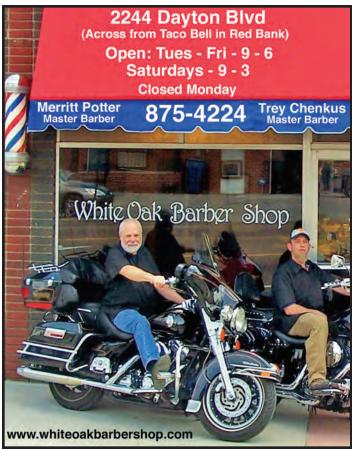

Joe Cool's Biker Health

I cannot believe how quickly winter has blown by. Actually, I would not call the weather we had "winter." The temperatures never got cold enough to keep me off my bike. Now the Earth is closer to the Sun so our temperatures are perfect for two wheeling everyday. So take precautions to protect your skin from the Sun's ultraviolet rays.

Most people have suffered from at least one bad sunburn. The beginning of sunburn is shown by hot, pink skin. Later comes swelling, burning pain, and possibly blistering. As the burn leaves, peeling inevitably appears. Peeling means that the skin is thickening up to protect itself from further sun damage. If burned skin continues to get exposed to sun, damage can't be repaired. Even if damage is not visible, skin cells mutate with each sun exposure. Over a lifetime these mutations may add up to cancer, a problem seen on gardeners who work unprotected in the sun. A severe sunburn is one of the biggest risk factors in getting a melanoma skin cancer. There is no way to stop, stall, or reverse a developing sunburn. Aspirin or ibuprofen helps the pain and cool water soaks help the swelling and redness. Sitting in front of a fan may help too. Creams, lotions, or sprays containing onepercent hydrocortisone may help ease pain and itching. Mentholcontaining products are soothing. To insure that skin recuperates completely from sunburn, spend a minimum of two weeks out of the sun. The consequence of staying in the sun will be another, nastier burn.

In addition to preventing sunburn, taking measures to protect against the sun can also prevent chronic, ugly, or harmful changes in skin. Long term exposure to ultraviolet rays causes damage first to the surface epidermis, then to deeper tissues. Over time, damage occurs to pigment-making cells and elastic tissue, resulting in blotchy color in sun-exposed skin. Much of what is considered normal skin aging is really the result of life-long exposure to sunlight. "Liver spots," "crows-feet," rough "chicken skin," "red necks," and easy bruising on hands and arms are all signs of this exposure.

Skin cancers may be recognized as red spots or bumps that may bleed easily. Their growth may be slow, as on the body, or faster, as on the thin skin of the face. Most common, and usually least intrusive of the skin cancers, are basal cell carcinomas. These lesions frequently bleed, but infrequently hurt. Although they can invade deeply into the skin they rarely metastasize (spread into the rest of the body). Take precautions even if the sky is cloudy. Don't forget, it is possible to burn on an overcast day.

When motoring down the highways, cover skin with gloves, a hat or helmet (as required by law) with ear and neck protection, long sleeves, and pants. Button up the neck of long sleeve shirts. Light cotton reflects heat and is a cooler fabric.

On skin that can't be covered with clothing, use an SPF 15-50 sunscreen. SPF (Sun Protective Factor) is a measure of effectiveness in preventing sunburn. A sun block is different from a sunscreen and may protect against more ultraviolet rays. Look for a block containing a titanium oxide if you are very sunlight sensitive. The new "sport" sunscreens are less likely to sweat off. Otherwise, reapply the sunscreen or block every hour during long rides when necessary.

Even with a sunscreen on it is still possible to get burned. Reapplying the sunscreen doesn't extend the time of protection; it only replenishes what sweats off. And don't forget a sunblock for







lips. Chapped lips may really be sunburned.

Generously apply sunscreens and sunblocks 30 minutes before sun exposure. Sunscreen chemicals take time to bind to the skin's surface. Try not to apply to the forehead, by not applying a sunscreen there; one can avoid stinging eyes from sunscreen chemicals in sweat.

Don't neglect your eyes in sunlight. Studies have shown an increased risk of early cataract formation with prolonged sun exposure. Protect eyesight with sunglasses, but don't get extremely dark lenses. Behind darker lenses eyes dilate, allowing more ultraviolet light to enter the eyes. Buy good quality glasses coated with a UVA blocking filter.

Enjoy your summer rides with out the threat of sun exposure. Use protection that will keep your skin safe from the sun's rays. Remember to take care of yourself, because if you won't, who will?

As I mentioned before... For this summer, Kat, my beautiful wife, and I have talked about organizing a couple's riding group. This would be for couples who each have their own motorcycle and enjoy riding in and around our area on beautiful sunny days. We can ride together as a couples group, as well as, plan for his or her "only" rides. Giving the couples chances to enjoy the pleasures of riding together and apart. We have no specific plans as yet, but we would like to hear from other biker couples that ride. All makes, models, sizes, and colors are welcome and any type of motorcycle is accepted too. I have been asked most often is... "Do you get paid to write these articles?" The answer is "No," which begs the follow-up question, "Then why do you do it?"

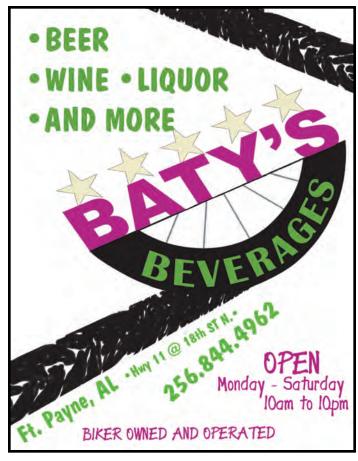

when I can.

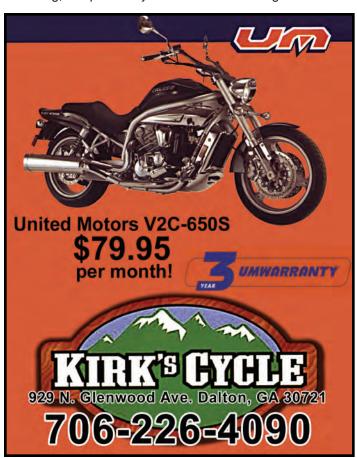

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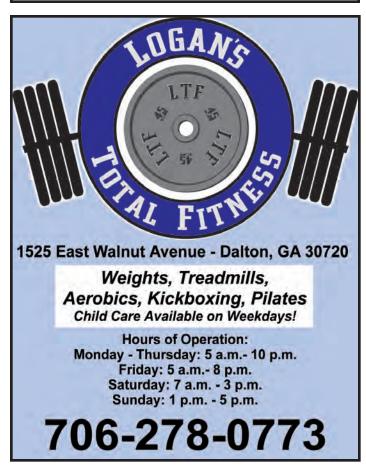
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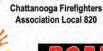








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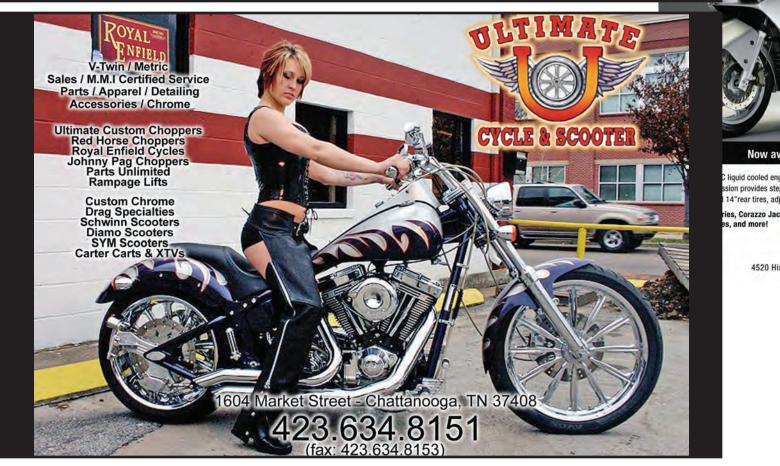






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Blowing Smoke

Over the past six months we've looked at women in motorcycling ranging from women's clothing to the history of women in motorcycling to

women bike builders. Hopefully, many of the female riders have read these and maybe are thinking of getting out their on your own. The fact that I spend a lot of my free time at a motorcycle dealership allows me to see the increase in female riders first hand. Many of you that I have spoken with either are just getting into riding or really want to, but aren't sure where to start. So, this article is geared toward you. Don't get me wrong this article applies to you guys out there also because there are a lot of you that are just starting to ride.

First, let me say that whatever fears/concerns that are holding you back will completely be erased once you take your first ride. But, before taking that first ride be sure and take a safety course. I highly recommend the Motorcycle Safety Foundation Riders Course which is offered in over 1,500 locations nationwide. Locally, the class is offered in Chattanooga, TN at Chattanooga State (423-697-3100) and at South East High School in Dalton,



GA (800-245-4410). In Tennessee you can get your license just by taking your certificate to the DMV, however, in Georgia a written and driving test must still be taken. For you more seasoned riders an Experience Riders Course is also offered. It may seem like you hear a lot about this course, but it is definitely worth it, plus you can get a discount on your insurance (HYPERLINK "http://www.msf-usa.org" www.msf-usa.org).

Being a beginner, male or female, there are certain things that you should know are going to happen.

1. You're going to drop the bike. At least once. Luckily, this usually happens at slow speeds when turning. Therefore, purchase engine guards if you're purchasing a cruiser or sliders if it's a sport bike. There will be people out there that tell you they've never dropped theirs. They're either lying or it hasn't happened to them yet.

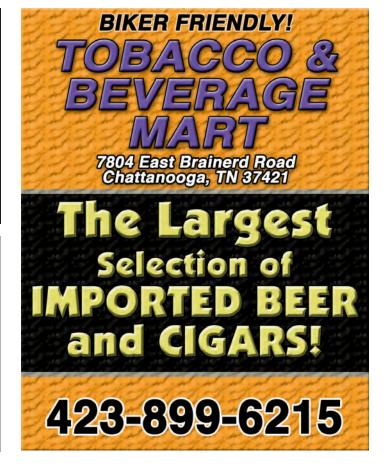
2. You're gonna be nervous and get frustrated often. You know the saying "Rome wasn't built in a day," well that truth applies here. Take your time and learn from your mistakes.
3. You will get advice from others whether or not you want it from both riders and non-riders. Everyone seems to have some sort of comment when they find out you ride.

4. You will spill gasoline all over the tank. At least once. If you're me, then you learn quickly to carry some sort of soft cloth with you to wipe off the occasional spill.

5. You do not want to be stuck out in the middle of nowhere out of gas. If you're bike doesn't have a fuel gage, learn







quickly whether or not you have a reserve tank or an "idiot light" as I like to call it.

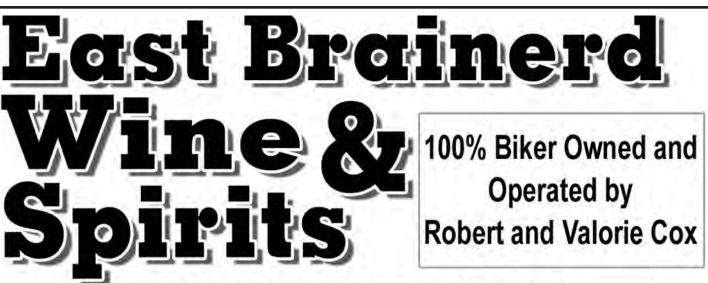

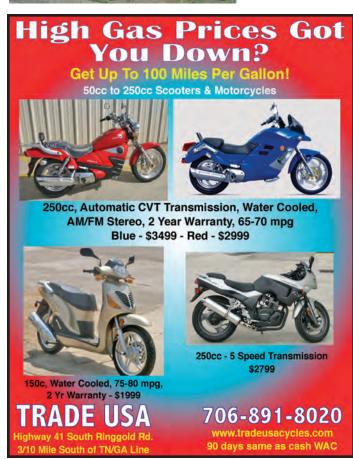


the trip to their local dealer and take the plunge after viewing the movie. One thing I liked about the movie was the way it portrayed the lure of the "open road" and how motorcycles satisfy

that urge in a way that no other form of transportation can. The other thing I liked was the way the movie showed the attraction of "group involvement" and the "brotherhood" that may be found among cyclists.

Periodically I get requests for "Wings in the Wind" info due to my articles in "Road Rash" so I thought I would take a minute to discuss "Wings" and invite anyone interested to contact me. "Wings in the Wind" is a non-denominational Christian motorcycle ministry based in Chattanooga with members from over 20 different churches represented in the Chattanooga chapter alone. We have sport bikes, metric cruisers, Harleys, touring bikes, and dual-purpose bikes with members ranging from 17 to 70 in age and we warmly invite newer riders. The only requirement for membership is to be in agreement with our "Beliefs" and "Conduct" statements (found on our Web site) and validation with signatures. After becoming a member attendance in two events per year is required and there is no cost at any time for membership. Just like any other club or ministry we realize we are not what everyone is looking for, but if you think we fit your needs please contact me for additional event information. We would love to have you!

"Wings in the Wind" Group Rides:
Supper rides – These rides are on Tuesday or Thursday
nights after work to small towns in the vicinity for supper





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and fellowship (about once every three weeks).

Longer rides:

These rides are on Saturdays and normally are to remote locations for a half-day or more (about once every three weeks). For fun sometimes we split up into

smaller groups with different leaving points and routes but converge at the same ultimate destination.

Long Trip - This new "members only" event is our once a year ride for an extended period. This year 10 of us will be riding a five-day, 1200-mile, back roads trip around the valley through seven states.

Bed & Breakfast Couples Trip – This new "couples only" event is to a destination somewhat close for a Friday night stay at a "Bed & Breakfast".

Service Projects:

Serving the Homeless – We work at the "Union Gospel Mission" by cooking and serving supper (last Thursday of each month).

Motorcycle support – We work with the Chattanooga Bicycle Club on their two big yearly events ("3-State 3-Mountain Century" and the "Sequatchie Valley Century") by escorting the bicycles (2500 this year) out of town and supporting them on the 100-mile routes. We will provide about 25 support motorcycles this year for the "3-State 3-Mountain" event. They even place the "Wings" logo on

their event t-shirts.

Trail of Tears Ride – Our normally help here is in the form of traffic direction. The CMA handles this event in a big and excellent way.

Chattanooga City events – We support the city on events such as the "HOG Rally", as coordinated with our contacts within the City government.

Various other non-biker related activities with the elderly or youth (to be determined).

Meetings:

Monthly meetings – Our monthly meetings are held in various members' homes and include supper (3rd Thursday night of month).

Combined Wings Meeting – This once a year lunch meeting open to all the "Wings" chapters is at a central location one Saturday in May.
