

I just wanted to take this time to say "thank you" to the people who made the transition more bearable (in case I'm too busy riding later)! I've already mentioned Greg, Zane, and Tommy but I shouldn't forget Mountain Creek Harley-Davidson's new Service Manager, Chuck Ferro either. I'll admit, he don't talk like he's "from 'round here," but he's a great guy on top of his job who really seems to care. Those kinds of people really make a difference!

There are many unwritten "biker rules." One of those is that you never ask to ride someone else's bike. Never. No matter how bad you want to. 

I want to start with an email from our own Reverend Booger.

'As a contributor, reader, and supporter of the your magazine, I would like to say a great big thank you for running the letter that you ran in Tears on Black leather this

month. While my heart goes out to the family that lost a loved one, I really do think that by running that very well written and worthwhile letter you may have saved another life. It is with pride that I say that it was one of the finest

pieces that has ever been in the magazine."

I felt the exact same way about the account of Ronald Callaway Jr.'s accident and death by his friend and riding companion, Chad Chambless. It was an honest and sobering eyewitness account of the tragedy. It made the hair stand up on the back of my neck. The truth was told without any attempt to sugarcoat the facts. I really appreciate Chad's candor.

As I read the story I flashed back to 2005 when I

witnessed Moleman's high-speed wreck on our way to California. It's forever burned into my mind's eye. I had never seen anything like it before, and I never want to see anything like it again. Once in a lifetime is enough.

Our first day was interstate through Nashville and heading toward Arkansas. About 30 miles east of Jackson, TN I had a flat tire (on a brand new tire). No problemo... I pulled over, pulled the nail, plugged the tire, and pumped it up. We were off and running, or so we thought. As soon as I started rolling I could tell there was a definite problem. The bike bucked like a bucking bronco. The tire looked

normal, but the sidewall was collapsed on the inside. D#@it, I'd have to call the Jackson Harley dealer and get... tooowwwed. They came got me, fixed the tire and didn't even charge me. We continued toward Memphis, crossed the Mississippi and then picked up the two lanes



in Arkansas. We ended the long day in Jasper, AR right before a monsoon hit. We had planned to camp the first night, but since we were running behind schedule, we found a mom and pop motel. Luck was with us. It was a gully-washer that lasted all night.

The next day we started out in the rain, but by midday it cleared and it turned out to be a beautiful afternoon. We finished traversing Arkansas and were heading through Oklahoma. By day's end, we would be across Oklahoma and more than halfway to California. It was about three or four o'clock when tragedy struck. We were about 10 miles East of our gas stop in Enid, OK. We had been traveling on a divided four lane (75 mph. speed limit) for an hour or so when I noticed I was closing way too fast on a van. You close pretty fast when you're running 85 to 90 on a vehicle that's running maybe 50. I checked the passing lane, hit

the throttle and flew around the guy at 90 plus. Mole was watching me and did the same thing, however, he didn't realize that the van was going so slow. When he looked back he was maybe six feet from the van. He told me later, he knew he was going to die. He ricocheted off the van as he knew he was going to die. He ricocheted on the van as he hit right below the driver's taillight. When I looked in my mirrors to see him come around, I saw his bike sideways in the left lane and him high siding the Road King. It took me a quarter mile to get pulled over. When my feet hit the ground my legs were shaking so badly I almost hit the deck. As I was running back, calling 911 on my cell phone, all I could see was the bike and "stuff" lying in the road. I couldn't tell if he was a part of the stuff or not. As I got closer I saw him standing on the side of the road talking to the guy that was following behind him in a car. He was a freaking mess, but he was alive and walking. Oh, I forgot to mention that we were not wearing helmets and had on sleeveless shirts.

Mole had bounced and/or slid a good 100 feet before he jumped up, dazed, and in disbelief. Next time you're running 85 down the interstate just imagine yourself jumping off. It's hard

to imagine.

The ambulance came and carried Mole to St. Mary's hospital in Enid, OK. The doctors were amazed that he was alive. He needed six stitches in his forehead and he had the worst case of road rash that I had ever seen. His sleeves of tattoos were

barely even visible. Needless to say, the bike was totaled. The emergency room doctor, Dr. Price was nice enough to give Jimmy a ride back to the motel room I had gotten us. Later that evening he called from the front desk asking how Jimmy was. He had stopped by after having dinner with his wife. Now, that's what I call a doctor. I wrote a letter to the local newspaper about the care Jimmy received from Dr. Price. To make a long story short, I got Mole on a plane the next day and then took the long way home. I was going to complete our trip, but the joy was gone. Besides, I needed to get back home and check on my boy.

When this mag hits the street we will be down to 21 days

before our trip to Yellowstone. This year we will all complete

the trip unscathed.

We are planning on trying something new. I will be posting daily updates on our Web site for those of you that want to follow along. I will include pictures from our day and maybe even a short video. Hopefully, it will encourage some of you to give it a whirl. It just ain't the same when you trailer them folks.



HERE'S THE RUB

"I took the one less traveled by, and that has made all the difference" – Robert Frost

There is a scene in the classic movie "Pee Wee Herman's Big

Adventure" where Peewee's pride and joy (his Schwinn bicycle) is missing, and he is subjected to viewing everybody else in the world riding bicycles. I know how he felt! While it was being painted, I went twenty-eight days without my motorcycle! I am not sure there is a word to adequately describe what happens to a man when he is deprived the opportunity to ride. I am aware people up north go all winter stuck in cages, but they do it collectively. Nobody in the frozen tundra during the wintry weather months gets to ride. My dry spell came during the best spring weather and everybody (but me it seemed) was on two wheels. They do have a word for their communal malady up north. They call it "cabin fever." An entire state goes mad until it becomes too much to bear and they banish their leisure suit/white belt/white shoes crowd of snowbirds to inflict misery upon Southerners (who had the good sense to be born



in a climate that permits riding a motorcycle year-round)!

Too long without sunshine will make you depressed. Don't scoff! Scientists have termed it "Seasonal Affective Disorders" (or S.A.D.), and without getting bogged down in a dissertation on the importance of a proper balance of serotonin, or epinephrine, dopamine, and Vitamin D and its effect on the neurotransmitters – trust me, "going without," simply makes you squirrelly!

I thought Motorcycle Affective Disorder (M.A.D.) might be apropos to describe my period of motorcycle abstinence. A female friend told me, "Men can only handle one emotion at a time." Simply using the word "horny" will probably get that point across... so we'll let it go at that.

Here is the exact conversation I had with Kenny... "I like it all black but other people have done all black so I want something that is all black - but at the same time not all black. The group that I ride with has orange in their colors, but I am not crazy about orange. I am a Georgia fan, so it has to be orange - but at the same time not orange! I would like a stripe of some kind but nothing gaudy, almost like it wasn't there at all!" All this time Kenny was nodding his head in agreement, as if anything I'd said made sense. I continued, "I am looking for a bike that screams both, 'Hey, look at me!' and 'What are you looking at?' simultaneously!" Kenny said, "Yeah, I can do that!" We shook hands and parted.

A month later, I picked it up and he'd nailed it. It was solid black with a ghost-orange-ice beneath a stealth brick colored stripe that only comes out in the brightest of light... and when the sun does hit it just right, it "pops" a brilliant metallic bronze hue.

Moleman has promised that Road Rash would debut it as a featured bike of the month but I do not know if it will photograph well. In pictures, it either comes out solid black or reflects the flashbulb and all you see is a blinding light! You really have to see it in person to appreciate its beauty. I have some more customizing ideas, but like most people, I have more ideas than I do cash. Besides, I couldn't stand the down time right now. Next month I am going to write about riding - not going without!

I have had older men come up and tell me about their bikes they had when they were young, grandmotherly type ladies explain how much they enjoyed riding with their late husbands, and various other tales of motorcycling from various other types of people. I think sometimes people probably get the impression that I am all about miles, but I have learned that stopping, looking, and chatting is part of the enjoyment of being in the wind too.

Also I have noticed that certain places on certain routes have become automatic motorcycle stopping

places. Out of convenience, location, or for some other reason a particular store, gas station, or other stopping place will become a magnet to motorcycles. I like the camaraderie of these stopping spots. It's good to have all these different riders on different bikes from different backgrounds together in one place getting along. It's the kind of place you come in as a stranger and leave feeling like you knew everyone your whole life.


I think I will compile a list of all these local gathering spots and I invite all of you to send in your suggestions. I think that will be my summer project. Well that about wraps it up for this month.

Blowing Smoke

As I sit to write this article, I am once again preparing for a trip out West with my

father and our church. I am very excited to be headed out for some rest and relaxation. We have been working like crazy around RT Cycles with the rising gas prices. It seems like everyone wants to be on two wheels. If you're one of the new riders, I want to welcome you and wish you safe riding. With that said, I wanted to let everyone (especially the women) know of some upcoming women's events.

July 17 is National Ride To Work Day (www.ridetowork. org). I hope you will all join me and ride your bike to work.



July 18 - July 20 is the North Dakota Ladies Motorcycle Run (www. ndladiesrun.org). It is the longest running women's motorcycle event in the US, celebrating 21 years in 2008. The purpose of the rally is increase public awareness and to encourage women to ride and socialize with other lady riders. The organizers really put an emphasis on networking. Events include poker runs, group rides, a bike show, parade, and a special church service.

August 15-17 is the Alberta Women's Rally hosted by Women In The Wind (www.witwnorthwindriders.com). The event is only \$35 for non-members and includes rides through the beautiful countryside of Alberta, and of course, a motorcycle show.

August 22 - 24 if the third annual Women's Sportbike Rally in the Great Smoky Mountains. Rally headquarters will again be located at Fontana Village Resort in Fontana Dam, North Carolina.



There is a three-day event called "Femmoto" at the Las Vegas Motor Speedway in Nevada in October (www.femmoto.com). On **October 3**, the track is open to women or men, and you are not required to own the bike you ride - but you are during the other two days (October 4 and 5). There are \$25 street demos for men



and women available all three days. The last two days, they offer an on-track demo (for women only) that cost \$135. All the proceeds go to the Susan G. Komen Brest Cancer


Ingredients:

1 1/4 cups Zwieback Toast Crumbs 1/3 cup Margarine, Melted 1/4 cup Cold Water 3 each Large Eggs, Separated 1 1/2 teaspoons Lime peel, Grated 2 cups Whipped topping, Thawed 2 tablespoons Sugar 1 envelope Unflavored Gelatin 1/4 cup Lime Juice 1/2 cup Sugar 16 ounces Neufchatel cheese, Softened


Directions: Combine crumbs, sugar and margarine; press onto bottom of 9-inch spring- form pan. Bake at 325 degrees F., 10 minutes. Cool. Soften gelatin in water, stir over low heat until dissolved. Add juice, egg yolks, 1/4 c sugar and peel; cook, stirring constantly, over medium heat 5 minutes. Cool. Gradually add gelatin mixture to the softened Light Neufchatel cheese, mixing at medium speed on electric mixer, until well blended. Stir in a few drops of green food coloring, if desired. Editor's Note: Eddie's article from last month is being reprinted due to an omission last month. Sorry for our error.

As residents and visitors walk the sidewalks of re-vitalized and always active downtown Chattanooga, few realize there is a dark side hidden beneath their feet. The bricked over knee high window arches visible from alleys and sidewalks and stairwells that descend below grade to blank walls are some of the strange scenes visible when exploring downtown. From appearance a person might be led to the conclusion that either the downtown buildings are sinking or there is another building level below ground. Well, the buildings are not sinking! It's a fragment of the past that even those of us that grew up in this area have been totally oblivious to for most of our lives.

In the 1800's Chattanooga was plagued by a series of devastating floods, the worst being the flood of 1867, which put downtown Chattanooga under five feet of water, and pretty much completely destroyed the city. Twenty years later, following the flood of 1887, it was decided by a group of industrious business owners and city leaders that rather than build a levee around the city the best option was to build the downtown level up. It was a massive project involving removing soil from the upper areas (County Courthouse, etc) and depositing the soil, along with local foundry wastes, in the lower areas (Market Street, Broad Street, etc). The new elevation was raised to what was previously the bottom of the second floor. As part of the project the original doors and windows were bricked over and the second floors were then converted to serve as the new entrances at street level.


Today, numerous downtown buildings have very interesting basements offering a glimpse of the day they hosted daily pedestrian traffic while serving as the main entrances. There are underground passageways connecting some of the buildings downtown that were once hallways and alleys connecting many of the downtown businesses above ground.



Some of the monuments to the past that can be viewed from outside buildings are the almost buried window arches located next to the 7th Street sidewalk at the United Way Building and also buried window arches in the alleyway behind the old Krystal on Cherry Street. This project, which was a massive earth moving and logistical undertaking, has amazed local historians today in regards to the lack of coverage by the news media of that day. There was very little information documenting the transformation other than a few articles in the local paper. Today about all there is to read on the subject is one folder in the Local History section of the Bicentennial Library. This unusual part of the past was forgotten over the



years until the discovery by UTC professor Dr. Brown almost a century after the original project was completed. Dr. Brown's discovery was brought about as a result of his conversations with local utility workers who reported sightings of buildings underground. Employees of Blue Cross daily use a tunnel beneath Broad Street as a means of going from one side of Broad Street to the other. This passageway was once the street level where people walked about shopping and going

about their daily business. There is much still unknown about the series of chambers, tunnels, and large cave-like rooms crisscrossing under our feet, and some details we'll never know.

Sometimes what we don't know can't hurt us, other times it can. There are many critical systems on our bikes that we don't see, but neglecting them could result in disastrous consequences. The wise rider always spends the effort and funds to periodically care for such important things as chain tension, cable condition, valve adjustment, air pressure, fork oil and brake fluid condition/level, cam chain tension, and other critical maintenance items. These systems properly maintained keep us running safely without an unexpected stop on the roadside, or worse a rear wheel lockup at 70 mph. on the Interstate. If you are not mechanically inclined, take your two-wheel buddy to your favorite shop and let them check him out for those hidden things that will directly impact your safety and peace of mind.

prescription, words of advice, or both, but also may require a short hospital stav in more severe cases. If you personally struggle with this frustrating problem I would



Joe Cool's Biker Health

If you wanted to improve the performance or appearance of your motorcycle, would you trust just anyone to use a wrench or airbrush on something as important to you as your scooter?

Of course not, you would want the best-qualified mechanic or custom specialist you can find. So when it comes to getting help for improved performance and appearance of your body, you should find the best-qualified personal trainer available.

I am an Exercise Physiologist. I teach exercise sciences at two colleges. Some of the classes I teach are for trainers who wish to improve their training techniques. I am a trainer myself and I specialize in people with metabolic or physiological issues. Most of the people I train have suffered physical set backs due to illness or injuries. So it is important that I have an excellent understanding of the effect of exercise in relationship to their condition. I have achieved this valuable knowledge through education, training, certifications and years of experience.

To assure your absolute satisfaction in your selection of a fitness professional, you must ask your potential

trainer to provide you with information about their education, training, certifications and experience. A college degree in exercise sciences should be the standard, but it is not. Ask to see the trainer's credentials. Do not just take their word for it, relating to their trainer's certification. There are many certifying bodies such as IFPA, NSCA, NESTA, and ACSM. These are just a few certifying acronyms available for any one who wishes to hang a shingle as a personal trainer. The American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM) is one of the

top accrediting bodies in the world. Over the years I have attended many ACSM training courses and earned at least five professional certifications with them.

To keep my certifications current, I must continue to enhance my education by attending courses, seminars, and training sessions. Many certifications out there do not require a trainer to keep up with his or her education. Some of the local fitness facilities give their own certification. They do not require a potential trainer to have any education or experience at all. The facility will simply require that they complete an 8-16 hour course on very basic exercise concepts that is only valid in their gym. Then these people are let loose to do as they will with uninformed clients. If this easily attained certification is not good enough for other fitness facilities, why would it be good enough for you?

Personal trainers are everywhere. There are no organizations that regulate personal trainers. So, anyone can claim to be a personal trainer. If you make







the decision to give your hard-earned money to a trainer, make sure they are qualified to work on your most prized possession; your body. Whether you go to a mainstream fitness facility, a personal training studio, or if a trainer comes to your home, you need to get all the information you can about the trainer before beginning this important relationship.

I have just scratched the surface on what you should look for in a good personal trainer. It starts with a well-educated, well-trained and experienced professional. Not just a person who looks good in spandex. Just because this person can train his or herself does not mean they have the capacity to safely and successfully train others.

Next month, I will discuss the aspects of your personal expectations of your trainer based on your goals and desires in your training program. Remember to take care of yourself, because if you won't, who will? A personal trainer, perhaps?

Kris Turner Update

My name is Kris
Turner. I have been living
in the East Brainerd
area for 10 years. The
only difference between
myself and the rest of
the neighborhood kids is,
I put my life and career
on the line almost every
weekend professionally



racing motorcycles. It all started a week before I turned four, when my little Suzuki 50 four wheeler was stolen out of the garage. My dad bought a Suzuki JR 50 to replace it. I started to race motocross (under my former identity of Kris Hardy) and raced all the way up to 2004, winning many Southern All Star races, Mega series and Ultra series races. I also won some Victory Sports indoor races during the winter. In 2005, I was getting a bit tired of all the injuries and decided to put 17-inch wheels and slicks on my YZ 85 and race SEMRA. Through the year I gradually got better and won the GP 85 Championship. In '06, I moved up to a Honda RS 125 in WERA and was plagued



the first half of the year with bike problems (being on an older '93 bike). In June a little trading went on and I got a newer '96 bike with new updates, and I started winning races. At the end of '06, I flew to Valencia, Spain with my dad after being selected for the Red Bull Rookies Cup Selection.

Out of 26 Americans and 200 kids worldwide (that were also selected to attend the try outs) I was picked along with three Americans (both from the left coast) and 20 Europeans to race in the Red Bull MotoGP Rookies Cup. The season didn't go as well as planned, going through two DNFs due to mechanical problems and one with me crashing while passing for second. I did finish on the podium in third in a rainy wet Mugello race in Italy and came on top in Assen, Holland with up to ten bikes battling for the lead at one point. But those of you who saw the Colin Edwars and Nicky Hayden finish there in '06 know how "entertaining" the last chicane can be. I lead into the last set of turns after passing Cameron Beubier earlier in the lap. Luis Salom stuffed up the inside while I was entering the chicane and pushed the front tire until it hit my bike, sitting me up and sending me across the astro turf just as Edwards did. I crossed the line first, but was penalized five seconds. Because of that, I was placed in third.

This is a new year... 2008. Writing articles for Road Racing World and having my results when I did have them earned me a chance with the M4/Emgo Suzuki team. John Ulrich and his team gave me a bike and team leathers to race this year in the WERA Nationals and Regionals and some CCS/ASRA... and maybe (with some luck) AMA near the end of the year. I am really happy to be given this chance and continue to progress every time I'm on the bike, understanding how the bike works and getting a feel for it. I am real excited with how this year has been

going so far and I know John and his team are too. Not to mention my parents!

I was excited to get to ride the new Suzuki 600 that M4/Emgo Suzuki provided me at Barber Motorsports Park, a more professional track than I have been on. When we showed up Friday, we got everything out of the trailer and headed out for the first session. On the first few sessions I wasn't exactly as fast as I would have liked, but after a nap at lunch I picked up the pace a little and made some suspension adjustments to get the cobwebs out. When we got to the hotel that night the clouds busted loose and the rain started to come down. It rained all night, so in the morning it was too wet for me to go out. I figured there was no point in it since I didn't plan on racing in the rain and it was supposed to dry up before the races. The first and only race for me on Saturday was the Medium Weight Solo 16, a 16-lap race that started with a bit of water still on the track. The straights were dry and about half the turns were. I got to the lead at the start. When we got to "the roller coaster," an off-camber downhill turn that was wet, I started sliding around. The guy behind me (on rain tires) slipped up the inside and was in my way after that. I was not able to get past him. Tim Vosnick came from behind, passed myself then the leader, and started to open a little gap. I got a little inspired and worked by the slower rider. I just rode at a comfortable pace in second until we got the halfway flags. I realized that there was a dry line carving through the rain all the way around the track. I decided to try to reel in Vosnick in the lead and attempt to work by him. I put in a few good laps and was within a second of him when the bike began to surge on me and finally bogged down. I came into the pits to see the leader getting the white flag and was told by my dad that the tank was dry. I was kind of upset about pushing it a little, being within striking range of the leader and then running out of gas with just a lap left.

The next day, Sunday, I was determined to go faster and get into the low 30's. In the first practice, I burned some laps and did the same for the second session. For the first race, "750 Superbike," I knew I had a good shot at winning, even though I was starting in the seventh row. A good start put me in fourth by the first turn (yeah I was proud of that start) and I quickly passed into third. I got by second and started to reel in Tim Hunt who was on a 750. I worked by him with just a couple of laps to go in this six-lap race and stayed in the lead to the finish. I was so happy to finally get a win on the 600. After a side-by-side wheelie

with Hunt on the backstretch, I rode to the trailer, changed out wheels with new tires and gridded up for the next race, "600 Superstock." I was starting on the second row in this one and got another good start. I led the whole race to the finish. I had two race wins back-to-back! The last race of the day was "750 Superstock," with the competition being the same as the other 750 race plus



Mr. Opie Caylor. Opie got a killer start, and I didn't, so by time I got by the people in front of me, he was too far ahead to run down. I rode away to second, which I was still happy with. At the end of the day, how could I be mad with two wins and one second place?

TWO OF OUR OWN



I am James Hays Jr. AKA "Lightning Jr.," a 21-year-old that lives in Rossville, Georgia. This is the history of my first bike, an orange and black 1973 CB750 Honda. I'm the third generation in my family to ride it.

The bike was originally bought at Honda of Chattanooga in 1973. Then my grandpa, Earnest T. Hays bought it from one of his Shriner brothers at the Red Bank Shriners Lodge when it had 3,500 miles on it. Afterwards, he took it to Jam-Up Cycles to have a 16-inch Harley-Davidson laced rear wheel installed. That was to gear it down so he and my grandmother could ride in Shriner Parades. She was also in an organization called the





"Eastern Stars."

My grandfather had many things done to it like installing a windshield, backrest, box, and putting Shriner symbols on it. He also installed a four-in-one header and jetted the carbs. He had the "hang two" seat put on for my grandmother's comfort. He also added a chrome "twisted" crash bar to give it that mean look.

My grandfather passed away October 14, 1987, when I was nine months old. My parents bought the Honda (for me) from my grandmother. At that time it had 12,500 miles on it. It was seldom ridden and stored in a garage (my dad and mom bought another bike to ride).

It was my first bike. I received it in 2007 with 20,173 miles on it. Since I've owned the bike, I've installed leather saddlebags and a chrome headlight visor. Today it has 26,769 original miles - and it's still kickin'!

I ride it everyday - rain or shine. Thanks to my family, I can hand down a classic bike to the fourth generation and keep the tradition going.

I would like to thank Road Rash Magazine and their sponsors for giving me the honor and opportunity of sharing my story with the community.
