








Bikes On The Ocoee







BBQ Bruschetta By Kent Whitaker

I've had several people ask me to give the Bruschetta recipes that I did with Jed Mescon on WRCB 3 NBC during the 3 Plus You show. I did a very quick version, which broken down to its lowest level is bread lightly basted with olive oil and toasted over coals, or grilled, or baked... you get the idea. For general conversation, that's Bruschetta. I've been told the whole idea is that this was a way to test the flavor of a batch of Olive Oil back in the day. Everything after that is for fun. Traditionally you'll see tomato, garlic, cannellini beans etc.

I went a bit Tex-Mex and Red Neck while cooking with Jed. Here's what I did.

Basic Bruschetta

Italian or French Bread sliced Basted lightly with Olive Oil or Pam Spray Olive Oil Toasted on the grill – lightly

Topping One – Tex Mex flavor Italian seasoning

Italian seasoned chopped tomatoes Salsa – Chunky

Pepper Jack or Mozzarella Cheese Combine the tomatoes and salsa. Place some cheese on the Bruschetta, or as we call it in the South... toast. Then top with the mix, sprinkle with seasoning, maybe even Cajun seasoning and serve. – DANG!

Topping Two – Red Neck Bruschetta Pepper Jack Cheese Pulled smoked pork BBQ Sauce. Yep, a different twist, but like I said; after the sliced bread and olive oil toasted... everything else is Gravy... or BBQ sauce!

MOTORCYCLE ANTI-LOCK BRAKING SYSTEMS

ABS was first developed in 1929 for aircraft and entered into general use on automobiles in the 70's. In 1981 BMW introduced ABS on a motorcycle. Early in the 21st century, ABS is now becoming more routinely available



on motorcycles, either as standard equipment or as an option.

But what the heck is ABS? To begin with, an Anti-Lock Braking System incorporates computerized sensors to determine when a wheel is on the verge of locking-up. It then gives instant instructions to the brakes to release and re-apply braking pressure (pumping) a whole bunch of times per second, while you are steadily engaging the brakes.

What results is slowing and/or stopping without skidding. (A skidding tire has less traction than one that is not skidding).

And they are very easy to use. In an emergency

situation on an ABS bike, just apply the brakes hard! Do not manually pump your brakes. Aggressive braking will initiate the ABS system automatically and the rider can concentrate on the immediate threat — and not the brakes. That's the good news.

On the other hand, many experienced riders can bring their non-ABS bike to a stop faster than an ABS equipped bike, by way of well-practiced, efficient, front and rear braking — particularly on clean, dry pavement. The question is can you do that under the stress of a life-threatening, panic-braking scenario? And even more to the point, how refined are your emergency braking skills on wet or dirty roads?

If you have attended a motorcycle event in which BMW was one of the participating vendors, you may have seen their demonstration and/or video where they compare the braking performance of ABS and non-ABS equipped bikes on flooded pavement. The demomotorcycles are equipped with outriggers, to prevent the bikes from completely going down. The bikes are each ridden into several inches of water whereby they apply emergency braking. The non-ABS motorcycle loses control, falls over onto the outriggers and spins out. However, the bike with ABS makes a controlled, straight-line stop.

MOTORCYCLES WITH ANTILOCK BRAKES HAVE FEWER FATAL CRASHES AND LOWER INSURANCE LOSSES THAN BIKES WITHOUT ANTILOCKS

ARLINGTON, VA — Antilock brakes for motorcycles are working as designed to reduce the chances of crashing, removing some of the risk that comes with riding on two wheels. A new study by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety indicates that motorcycles with anti locks versus without are 37 percent less likely to be in fatal crashes per 10,000 registered vehicle years. Bolstering this finding is a separate analysis by the affiliated Highway Loss Data Institute (HLDI) of insurance claims filed for damage to motorcycles. Bike models with anti locks have 22 percent fewer claims for damage per insured vehicle year (a vehicle year is one vehicle insured for one year, two insured for six months, etc.) than the same models without anti locks.

Stopping a motorcycle is trickier than stopping a car. For one thing, the front and rear wheels typically have separate brake controls. In an emergency, a rider faces a split-second choice to either brake hard, which can lock the wheels and cause an overturn, or hold back on braking and risk running into the emergency. This is when anti locks can help by reducing brake pressure when they detect impending lockup and then increasing the pressure again when traction is restored. Brake pressure is evaluated multiple times per second, so riders may brake fully without fear of locking up. Anti locks won't prevent every motorcycle crash. They won't help a rider about to be struck from behind, for example.

Anti locks are gaining traction among manufacturers and riders. More than half of motorcycle owners recently surveyed by the Institute said they would get anti locks on their next bikes. Buyers can find them on at least 60 new models (go to iihs.org for a list). Institute researchers compared the fatal crash experience of antilock-equipped motorcycles against their non-antilock counterparts during 003-08. HLDI did the same for insurance losses for the same group of motorcycles. HLDI also looked at injury claims.

Under medical payment coverage, motorcycles with antilocks registered 30 percent lower claim frequencies than bikes without this feature. Claim frequencies were 33 percent lower under bodily injury liability coverage.

"Motorcycle antilocks do make a difference," McCartt says. "They help make traveling on twp wheels less risky by reducing the chance of overturning a bike and crashing. Passenger vehicles still are safer, but if you're going to ride we'd recommend getting a motorcycle with antilocks."

This is an enjoyable ride without much traffic (after you leave Dayton) and it has four ascents and four descents. After leaving Spencer, there are some great twisties and a few nice places to pull off to enjoy your favorite refreshment. This route is not difficult on any style or type of bike or even for new riders as long as they have had some experience on curvy roads.

There are sections that are especially exciting on sport bikes or for any rider that likes to "lay them over." We usually stop at The Smoke House in Monteagle and chow down on their daily buffet before heading home. Say hi to JD for me and tell him you read about him and saw his ad in KSU. To do this you will need to take a right on 41A at the top of Monteagle Mountain and then backtrack to 41 and on to Tracy City.




heat race and dislocated his shoulder and injured his left hand and wrist. This season definitely shows that anything can happen in a race.

This ain't NASCAR folks! These riders ride in the rain and MotoGP is the most exciting racing in motorsports. The bikes hit speeds of 200 m.p.h. and are ridden by the best riders in the world. This is the first year for MotoGP to feature the 1000cc bikes and this race started the season off just right. There were no crashes and a lot of good racing in the front and in mid pack. After watching, I think that you will agree with me that this sport is poetry in motion.

Jorge Lorenzo of the Yamaha Factory Racing Team won the first MotoGP event of the year held at the Losail International Circuit in Qatar. Lorenzo started in the pole position and held the lead for the first three of the 22 lap race, keeping Casey Stoner (Respol Honda Team) and his teammate Dani Pedrosa at bay.

During lap three, Stoner passed Lorenzo on the long start/finish straightaway and held the lead until lap 19 when Lorenzo again took the lead. Pedrosa also passed Stoner and took second place while Stoner took third.

Monster Yamaha Tech 3 teammates Cal Crutchlow and Andrea Dovizioso took fourth and fifth respectively. American Nicky Hayden of Owensboro, Kentucky riding for the Ducati Team finished sixth with Álvaro Bautista (San Carlo Honda Gresini) finishing seventh. Stefan Bradl (LCR Honda) last year's Moto2 Champion finished a respectable eighth in his MotoGP debut. Héctor Barberá (Pramac Racing) had been racing for sixth but ran off the track when he pushed too hard in the last few laps. The Spaniard finished ninth, and the final spot in the top 10 went to Valentino Rossi (Ducati Team) who has been struggling since mounting the Ducatis.


